### Heraldry for Self-Isolators—Week 2

### Day 4—Canting Arms



The Queen's grandfather, the 14th Earl of Strathmore and Kinghorne, was granted the little shield in the middle as an HON-ORABLE AUGMENTATION (or special decoration) by his son-in-law, King George VI in 1938. If you look at the arms themselves you will see LIONS and BOWS which are a pun on the Strathmore's family name:

BOWES-LYON.

This kind of visual pun in a coat of arms is called CANTING ARMS—the arms "singing out" the name of the owner. The French call them "talking arms" - armes parlantes - but the idea is the same.

Rotten joke alert: "Why do heralds not pun? They just cant."

Another famous example comes from Spain: here are the arms of the region of Castile and León:







Canting Arms are close relatives of the REBUS like this one, the property of the 16th cent. Abbot Islip of Westminster.


Sometimes the "joke" has been lost over the years through words falling into disuse or just changing in pronunciation. Would you have guessed that these arms were canting? Another name for the cinquefoil is "FRAISE", like the French for strawberry.

So these arms belong to a **FRASER.** 






Berwick's arms show a bear and a wych-elm—hence Ber-wick




