


## A Different Kind of Test—Sir David Lyndsay of the Mount's Armorial

Coats of arms become more and more complicated as all the simpler designs have long been snapped up so the arms recorded in this glorious volume are fairly simple and you all ready have all the vocabulary necessary to provide each of the shields from the Armorial with a blazon. Have a go!



## **SUDOKU**

This week's puzzle is a Wee Stinker, made worse by the use of new material!

Two new Ordinaries (shapes which can only be put over the whole shield) and 7 new charges (which can go anywhere).



Ordinary 1 is a **PILE**—a triangle with its Base along the top of the shield. There can be as many as three of them.



Ordinary 2 is a SHAKEFORK—a sort of disappointed PALL as its ends do not reach the corners. Often seen in Ayrshire heraldry as the symbol associated with the Cunningham family who were big there in the late Middle Ages.




